



ER EMBEDS ITSELF IN CACY

he Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce is the "eyes and ears" of the business community.

"Advocacy is a foundational pillar of Chamber's of Commerce and this year we leaned in heavily to promote issues that would deliver results for our members," said Ryan Sempf the Chamber's vice president of government and external affairs.

"This year that included, working to improve the workforce participation crisis impacting lowa — promoting child care solutions for business and more funding for education programs," said Sempf. We also were very supportive of the tax-reform legislation that passed the legislature this year. Reducing corporate taxes was contained in our legislative agenda and we advocated strongly for the governor's approach to corporate tax reform, which was the most efficient and brought us down to the most competitive level."

Scott DeSousa, president of the Friedman Group, said during the course of his company's 50-plus year involvement with the chamber, they have shared its goals.

"(We've) been very involved with our political advocacy council as a chamber member," DeSousa said. "That includes meeting with them, letting them know our thoughts and concerns on the pressing issues that face business."

Chad Wolbers, UnityPoint Health president/CEO and advocacy chair for the chamber's executive committee, said the chamber engages in advocacy work on an ongo-

ing basis, largely through the Business Advisory Council. UnityPoint itself has benefitted from the advocacy efforts, particularly in its support of efforts to address medical malpractice reform, child care and education-program funding.

As the political landscape has changed in the past 10 to 15 years, according to DeSousa, members want the chamber to be involved on their behalf.

"If we can have one concentrat-

ed voice of hundreds of members it obviously carries more weight than just one voice, one member," he said. "And we see that, frankly, we're effective with it."

As part of those efforts, the chamber will continue reaching out to underserved business communities to give them a voice, DeSousa said. And that advocacy, according to Chamber President and CEO Molly Grover, "speaks to the heart and core" of the chamber mission.

"Our primary purpose is to serve as the voice of the business community," she said.

Being that voice now is more important than ever, according to Grover. So, in addition to leveraging relationships at the local, state and federal levels, Grover said the chamber continues to seek ways to host events that provide members the opportunity to engage with officials.

AIR SERVICE

Air service – what Grover called an "economic asset" – has been a chamber priority for years. She said the ability to move human talent in and out efficiently is a boon for businesses looking to invest in the community. And as COVID-19 mitigation protocols ease not only in Dubuque but nationwide, retention is the message the chamber wants to send where air







service is concerned.

"(The Dubuque Regional Airport is) competing with over 235 regional airports just like us who are working, fighting and advocating to retain local service," she said.


Dubuque Regional Airport Director Todd Dalsing said the airport should be looked at as two entities – general aviation/corporate traffic and commercial air service.

The general aviation/corporate traffic side, which

includes local tenants and the University of Dubuque flight school, has recovered well since the pandemic, Dalsing said.

In 2020, commercial air service went from a suspension of service to reduction. Prior to the pandemic, the airport had three flights per day and now has two per day. Advocacy, according to Dalsing, always has been critical from a partner like the chamber.

"It reflects the importance of air service from the board and the membership," he said.

On the state level, the business advocacy committee supported an aircraft labor and parts tax that the airport was lobbying for, Dalsing said. Because of the chamber's advocacy, the measure passed the House and Senate and is awaiting the governor's signature.

CHILD CARE

Child care also is a business issue the chamber has worked to address, according to Sempf. One of the biggest employment issues coming from the COVID-19 pandemic, he said, is an "overall reduction in the labor force." Data from February 2019 and February 2022 (the most accurate data available as of this printing) show that the Dubuque area is down about 2,000 employees, according to Sempf. That reduction in labor force can be split roughly into two groups — those who retired, and working age parents.

In order to get people back into the labor force, Sempf said child care must be more affordable and accessible for families, while employees in these facilities need a competitive wage to keep them in the field.

Tara Roddick, of Child Care Resource & Referral, said low wages, staff shortages and high supply costs are the main issues providers currently face.

Child care assistance (CCA) is not meeting the needs of providers, according to Roddick.

"The amount that providers are reimbursed is not equal to what they can charge private pay, which causes providers

to take less CCA families or none at all," she said. "There is a new bill (that may be on the governor's desk) that would allow providers to charge families the difference of CCA and private pay. This would not help families. Sometimes families cannot even afford their copayment for CCA."

During lowa's most recent legislation session, the chamber supported legislation that would reduce regulations on child care providers. One would increase the ratio of children per staff member for 2-year-olds and 3-year-olds in lowa. The other would have reduced the age requirement for full time employees at a child care facility to serve unsupervised. In a separate bill, employers would be eligible to receive a tax credit for helping to provide child care for employees. Both are awaiting the governor's signature.

Dave Lyons, of the Greater Dubuque Development Corporation, said a comprehensive survey of providers and employers was conducted to see where the needs were the greatest, and greater child care capacity was at the top.

Employers wanted to see additional capacity or options including early shifts and the ability to have flexible hours.

Lyons said that in the Dubuque area "child care capacity is quite limited," and expecting parents are told they will have to put their child on a waiting list for child care.

Lyons said potential solutions include making sure that those at the state and federal level know they need to increase the "historically low" child care reimbursement rates.

The industry itself also needs support for recruiting and retention, which Lyons said has been implemented through the Opportunity Dubuque Program at Northeast Iowa Community College.

A state program also allows for child care centers that are increasing capacity to receive grants to offset capital costs. Six local providers have taken advantage, according to Lyons.

The chamber, according to Lyons, has been helpful on child care issues through "aligning the interests in the community through conversations" to ensure that they are aware of pending federal legislation.

Dubuque Economic Development Director Jill Connors said child care is important for economic development because it supports the workforce.

"Good child care is two-fold," Connors said. "It helps with today's workforce and it helps with tomorrow's

workforce."

In addition to helping working parents go to their jobs with "peace of mind" that their child is in a quality, affordable child care facility, those types of facilities – with a "quality stimulating, appropriate developmental environment" – lead to school readiness.

RESTAURANTS

Jessica Dunker, of the Iowa Restaurant Association, said the restaurant industry has been "a bit of a mixed bag" since COVID-19 safety protocols began being lifted.

"Customer demand is back, but while

we have been allowed to operate without restrictions, it has been difficult to find our way back to pre-COVID revenues and profits," Dunker said.

More than one-third of restaurant operators in the state are at two-thirds of the staffing levels they need to recover from the pandemic, according to Dunker.

Additionally, market demands are increasing wages, while food-cost inflation has affected prices.

"In many ways, we've jumped out of the COVID frying pan to land in the flames of inflation and worker shortages," she said.

The Iowa Restaurant Association has focused on two key issues at the state level – regulation for third-part delivery apps like Uber Eats and Door Dash and alcohol distribution.

"The basic protections we've pushed for protect consumers by mandating basic food safety protocols are followed," Dunker said. "The proposed legislation also protects restaurant operators by ensuring mobile apps can't take their logo and menu and put it in their mobile app without a contract."

The alcohol distribution legislation would allow restaurants, bars and other businesses that sell and serve alcohol on-site to purchase up to five cases of canned cocktail or beer.

"This would help operators get through until their next truck delivery from a beer wholesaler," Dunker said.

The chamber, according to Dunker, has been a "solid partner" in advocating for legislation that helps the hospitality business.

"They have been instrumental in getting information out to businesses in Eastern

lowa, as well as speaking to key legislators about the legislation," Dunker said.

One of those legislators is Rep. Shannon Lundgren, who owns Trackside Bar & Grill. She said that as a small business owner, she was frustrated that laws and regulations from the federal and state government seem "to exempt or create loopholes" to help big business owners.

"Our family decided if we didn't feel represented then other small businesses probably felt the same," she said. "It was time to get involved to give a voice to the mom-and-pop businesses like ours."

Lundgren, also a member of the lowa Restaurant Association, said challenges of the rules and regulations in the restaurant industry were "exasperated during COVID."


"A lot of our laws are old and antiquated and needed revision," she said.

The chamber has helped ensure that its members are aware of legislation being worked on, according to Lundgren, and encouraged the membership to weigh and engage with elected officials.

"This is the most I have witnessed the chamber being engaged in more than 25 years of my involvement as a member," Lundgren said.

"Our family decided if we didn't feel represented then other small businesses probably felt the same. It was time to get involved to give a voice to the mom-and-pop businesses like ours."

Wayfarer Loffee

ayfarer Coffee, 955 Washington Street, is first and foremost a coffee shop but also offers smoothies, boba tea and lunch/breakfast items.

"We really envision ourselves being the front porch of the Millwork District," said owner Darin Shireman said.

He began working in coffee in 2003. Seven years later, he formed Wayfarer and opened a coffee shop at a commercial roasting operation in Platteville, Wis. In 2020, he sold that and built a warehouse and roasting facility in Dubuque. The following year, he purchased all of Inspire Cafe's assets.

Shireman, who recently joined the Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce, said two decades of experience give his coffee shop "a little bit of an advantage." Plus, they travel and work directly with growers for most of their coffee.

The Dubuque chamber, according to Shireman, is "super active," along with the city's young professionals group.

"We have ambitious growth aspirations on both our cafe and on the wholesale," he said. "We want to go multi-location and we want to expand the relationships that we're building internationally."




