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
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#### GIFT OF MEMBERSHIPS: SUNDOWN MOUNTAIN

This year marks half a century that Sundown Mountain has been able to offer the gift of membership in the Dubuque area.

General Manager Mark Gordon said the resort has grown "exponentially" especially in its first decade. In its first season, for example, Sundown had just a two-person chair lift, one rope tow and a single building. Now, the site, spanning 85 acres, has 21 trails of varying difficulty, two lodges, two terrain parks and more.

The resort's most popular offerings include its season pass and the Weekend Warrior pass. Gordon said the Weekend Warrior option began five years ago.

"We start our season with our open house and season pass sale, and that's the second Sunday in November," he said. "It's always the last time people in the area can get a pass and save \$100."

Gordon said the "biggest segment" at the resort is children, whether they're interested in learning to ski or just want

to enjoy the social activity at the lodge. "It's a great gift to get the kids off the computer games," he said.

Gordon also has seen growth in the 40- to 50-year-old demographic.

The family owned ski resort, according to Gordon, is a "family friendly area" that welcomes everyone from those interested in joining a ski team to those who aren't "really into traditional athletics," but want a space to enjoy themselves.

**GIFT OF SERVICE: TIDINESS PROJECT**

The Tidiness Project as a gift of service is a way for friends and family to "think outside the box," according to founder Heather Davis.

"It's a perfect gift for someone who has everything already, literally," she said. "It's easy for the gift giver too."

Her niche has become dealing with clutter and "chronic disorganization," she said.

"That seems to be where there's a huge need for it in the community," Davis said.

Her process includes a free consultation, where she and the client get to know each other and she's able to see the spaces that will be organized. That, she said, allows her to return with a plan.

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#### GIFT OF ENTERTAINMENT: PHOENIX THEATRES

Phoenix Theatres has been in Kennedy Mall since April 6, 2018, and is the only theater in the area with heated, reclining seats, according to owner Cory Jacobson. And there's a consistent price policy.

"We don't upcharge for any of that," Jacobson said.

Showings typically cost \$5 in the afternoon till 5 p.m., then \$8.75 for evening showings. Children and senior tickets cost \$5 all day.

"Certain folks have loyalty programs. Our loyalty program is we give you what I feel is a price I would want to pay to see a movie 365 days a year," Jacobson said.


Plus, he said the prices haven't been raised since opening at Kennedy Mall in 2018.

"Our business in Dubuque has literally never been better, particularly over the summer," he said.

The movies, according to Jacobson, are for people looking for a night out or a day with their family – think dinner and a movie.

"I think we really exist in a different space [than streaming services] ... We've got great products in 2024, and 2023, so we're really excited where all this is going right now," he said. "We are expecting a really full release schedule next year and in the last quarter of this year."

For those considering Phoenix Theatres as a gift of entertainment, Jacobson said that in addition to all auditoriums being fitted with premium sound systems, there's also the ability to reserve seat tickets ahead of time through the website or mobile app.

#### GIFT OF GIVING: HILLCREST FAMILY SERVICES REFLECTIONS IN THE PARK

Reflections in the Park has been Hillcrest Family Services' central fundraising event for nearly 30 years. It has grown from one volunteer wanting to do something for the company to "very much a community holiday event," according to John Bellini, chief business development officer.

"It's a family event from our perspective," Bellini said. "You can get together, listen to Christmas music over the holiday season. Get together with friends, colleagues, family members ... that's what brings people together."


For the past couple of years, Reflections in the Park has raised more than \$200,000 annually, with funds going directly to Hillcrest programs. Funds from previous events have gone toward the PATH program, homeless prevention program, Mentor Dubuque and the mental health center.

The most rewarding part of Reflections in the Park, according to Bellini, is connecting with volunteers. He said more than 200 volunteers help make the displays a reality.

This year's event kicks off with a walk-through event from 6-8 p.m. on Nov. 23 at \$10 per person and continues nightly as a drive-through experience from 5-10 p.m. Nov. 24 to Jan. 1 at \$10 in advance or \$12 at the gate.

#### GIFT OF EXPERIENCES: XTREME DANCE

Xtreme Dance is known for its elite competition, but that shouldn't make others shy away from the studio, according to owner Kylie Goedken.

"You don't have to be the elite competition route, you can just want to do it for fun," she said.

Kylie and her mother, Tracy, own Xtreme Dance, 1075 Cedar Cross Road, having purchased it in 2020. It resides at its original location under the original name Tessa Medinger used to establish the studio more than a decade ago.

"Our team went from like 50 to now we have almost 90. We've been trying to grow it," Kylie said. "We're really competition based, so a lot of people know us for being very competitive in the dance world. We're also trying to grow our recreational name."

Dancer ages range from 18 months to 18 years for recreational and competition classes. Xtreme Dance also has an all-start competition team, Iowa Elite. The studio offers a range of dance styles from jazz, hip hop and lyrical to ballet, contemporary and musical theater.

Kylie said there also are "mommy and me" and morning preschool classes.

The most popular classes, according to Kylie, are for ages 7 to 10, 4 to 7 and preschool. Classes run from September to the end of May, with an annual recital in June. The studio always is taking new

enrollments, which can be made through the registration tab on its website.

As of press time, Xtreme Dance was offering one free trial class to potential clients in any classes that have available space.

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#### GIFT OF GIFTS: DOLAND JEWELERS

Jewelry is a good traditional gift over the holidays because it's a "symbol of love," according to Nick Doland, co-owner of Doland Jewelers.

"Here we try our best to make it easy on the guy because a lot of times they come in with zero ideas ... A lot of times we know the customer, so we already know what she's wearing and kind of guide him on to the next gift," Doland said.

The family owned jewelry store has been a Dubuque staple since the 1990s, and, according to Doland, continues to

see growth "year after year."

"A lot of it is repeat customers that we've treated well, and we're always looking to add new customers to that as well," he said. "A lot of new customers come to us by way of engagement rings and wedding bands."

While engagement rings and wedding bands are popular year-round, Doland said they "pick up a bit during the holidays."

'With family back in town [or you're] going to see family, you figure it's a good time to propose," he said. "The biggest

increase though is in what we would consider fashion jewelry."

Those items can be as basic as diamond-stud earrings – "which we think every woman should have in her jewelry wardrobe," Doland said - or tennis bracelets and diamond pendants.

"We pride ourselves on staying on top of trends," Doland said. "We always want to have what's popular available, and we run a broad range of products."

Customers can grab stocking stuffers for less than \$100 all the way up to big diamonds, according to Doland.

mother to five children, Whitney Sanger started to notice the way society viewed food "in our community specifically" and wanted to do something about it. "And I realized just how much of an impact food has on the body, the mind, every aspect of our life," Sanger said. "And so, I remember just being very in tune with what my kids were eating and how it affected their body ... [and] then started to think of all the children and families that just don't have the luxury to choose ... when it comes to healthy eating, access to healthy foods."

So in 2019, the idea for Project Rooted was born, and Sanger founded the group with Brazen Open Kitchen's Kevin Scharpf. The goal for the duo is to create a community in which children are healthier and "more connected to real food," according to the Project Rooted website.

Project Rooted is involved with a lot of community projects, one of the largest being The Rooted Box – a program in which first graders throughout Dubuque receive DIY snack kits that introduce them to local foods and local growers.

"There are fun healthy recipes they can use at home .... We use creativity and get to explore and see where food comes from through virtual field trips," Sanger said.

The project also includes "Rooted Bucks," which are \$5 certificates that can be used at any area farmers market.

Project Rooted joined the Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce a few months ago, as of press time, following the organization's five-year strategic planning. The hope, according to Sanger, was to look at how Projected Rooted can build more partnerships in the community.

"[We] know the power of networking is so incredibly important in all aspects of your life," she said.

The benefits of joining the chamber, she said, are going to continue to develop

over time as the relationship builds and new ways to market the organization are developed.

The chamber is "so intertwined" in advocacy, particularly in relation to local food and education, according to Sanger,

which will provide learning opportunities as their relationship grows.

Plus, because Project Rooted is so new, Sanger said, they don't have a physical space and have related heavily on partnerships.

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


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The company's most recent change was to eliminate automotive tire sales, repairs and automotive service, BizTimes.biz reported in February. However, warranty repairs for power equipment and power sports purchases were implemented. No employees were terminated as part of that process.

In 2019, Theisen's was named the Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce's Business of the Year.

"We try to be as involved in Dubuque as we can be, and it is nice to be recognized for the work that we do," Peter Theisen told BizTimes.biz at the time.

In addition to serving as a go-to resource for the community in the retail sphere, Theisen's does its part to give back as well through the Theisen's More for your Community Grant Program.

Agencies that meet certain criteria within a 60-mile radius of a Theisen's location can receive funds to "jumpstart and/or sustain projects, which most effectively and directly serve the basic needs of families and children which include food, shelter, education, safety and health," according to the Theisen's website.

The grant program puts \$350,000 annually back into the community.

The farm store's Dubuque location has been at its current site on Dodge Street since 1979, with expansions in 2003 and 2009.


